**Speaker: Nancy Benay**  
**Topic: Exploring the**  
**Orchid Trails of France**

Nancy is a long-time orchid hobbyist and Francophile, who has traveled for over 50 years to France (hélas), having studied, lived, and traveled extensively throughout the country at various times in her life. Her interest in orchids began quietly in Western New York in the mid-1980s with the gift of a phalaenopsis. After Nancy's husband, Jacques, retired in 1990 they returned to Southern California. In 1998 she joined the Newport Harbor Orchid Society, and shortly thereafter the orchid bug hit. Not only did her collection grow exponentially in a short time, but given her love of travel she hankered to see orchids in their natural



habitat and has had the good fortune to see them growing in Malaysia, Ecuador, Thailand, Australia, Bolivia, Madagascar, South Africa, and Hawaii.

When Nancy discovered (thank you Lisa Humphreys of Lico Orchids) that orchids also grow all over Europe including France, it was a major "a-hah" moment for her. What better than to combine orchid hunting in France while exploring its beautiful regions and tourist sites.

In summer 2008 Nancy set off with daughter Françoise; future son-in-law Ryan; and his mom, Meg, to visit southwestern France where native orchids abound, and since then she has not turned back seeking to learn and gain expertise about these botanic jewels. Since then she has made many trips and met many French "orchidophiles" and native orchid experts.

In 2016 Nancy organized and conducted her first tour for the Orchid Conservation Alliance, and in May 2018 she conducted a second tour for 13 members of the **continued on p. 2**

**OCOS Orchid Judging Rules**

I would like to remind everyone who brings in orchids for judging at our monthly meetings that all the rules are spelled out in our directory. Please review the rules and determine which group you should place your plants in prior to coming to the meeting. This is the grower's responsibility, and plants placed in the wrong group may be disqualified.

One area of confusion has been where to place Species. The rules were revised a few years ago, it was decided that the Species Group should ONLY include species from one of the Primary Groups as these are often less showy than the hybrids. All other Species should be placed in the Botanical Group.

However, the placard for the Species Group did not make this clear, so we have not enforced this rule. The placard has now been updated and I hope that everyone will comply starting with the August meeting.

Another reminder: To give all members a chance to compete, only a maximum of FOUR plants per member is allowed in any one group. Anyone entering more than four plants per group will lose points they might have been awarded for that group in that month. Since it is impossible for the judges to check this prior to starting the judging, it will be done after the meeting when the judging entries are reviewed.

## Heat Takes its Toll

[**Editor's note:** I mentioned that the heat on July 6 had scorched several roses and a 30-year-old *nandina domestica* at my house. Janet responded with these photos and comments.] "Most of the damage happened in an area that was protected by shade cloth that was only 55 percent. Since that first heat wave (it got to 115 °F which I can

never remember having here) my netting has been changed around and added to, so that I only have one area that is still just 55 percent. The vanda and cymbidium growing area seems to be doing okay, with only a couple of cyms being bothered."

"I am officially ready for fall. I have had enough of this summer heat."



These two pictures are of the same plant, the top of which (right) looks like a forest after a fire. It has its own bucket, which is almost full, for its dead leaves.



One clump [shows sunburn] from a couple of large plants (left). The young plants did amazingly well; only one plant from each of two trays was affected (middle). This is the group that really surprised me (right). It is a line of mature *Onc. sphacelatum* that OCOS obtained from UCI. I have no room at present for additional shelving, so they are sitting on bricks, which puts them at a lower elevation than the nearby shelved plants, but they are in the same area as the ones that were burned. These guys, however, were totally unaffected by the ferocious heat and sun.



**August, A Warming Trend:  
Modifying Care Plans to Deal  
with the Heat of Summer**

As the temperatures wax across North America this month, our productivity tends to wane. In August, most people, it seems, take off for someplace cooler, such as the beach, an air-conditioned mall or Antarctica. Hobbyists weren't meant to swelter in 95-degree heat and, similarly, any orchids blooming this month tend to fade more quickly due to the high temperatures and light levels they receive. In August, it's easy to imagine what the earth will be like if it continues its current warming trend. No one really knows, specifically, what global warming may wreak upon us.

It is always my aim to make this column positive, uplifting and, occasionally, a bit inspiring, but the heat of August scares me as I imagine a future world where that might be the norm and I work harder than ever to keep my orchids and my garden from stressing out. My latest pet peeve is that the media is doing stories about the "positives" of global warming for gardeners, for example, that USDA zone 5 regions are having successes overwintering zone 7 plants. Don't buy into this baloney and become complacent about the issue. As the world warms, many plants (and animals) that can't adapt or migrate quickly enough will no doubt go extinct. Distribution of rainfall and other environmental conditions will change unpredictably, with resulting parched forests, wilted jungles and swampy deserts. So, as we struggle to keep our collections cool this month, think about what we can personally do to slow down this warming trend and keep the world safe for our children and our beloved orchids.

**COOLING.** Many intermediate- and cool-growing orchids have been feeling the stress of summer heat for more than a month, and signs of trouble, which can be slow to appear in orchids, are starting to reveal themselves. Stressed-out plants will often appear flaccid and limp or a blanched-out yellow-green color. Pleurothallids may even start dropping leaves when they overheat. Examine these plants carefully, above and below the pot. Often, all that is really necessary is to move the plant to a shadier, or cooler, spot in the growing area, but some are just not able to tolerate the heat for such a long period, especially when temperatures don't drop at night. Collections of portable miniatures can be brought into the air conditioning on such nights, but a large collection must be cooled with air flow, misting and increased shade. Make sure these stressed plants are properly potted and have any necrotic tissue removed; dead leaves and pseudobulbs are vectors for many pathogens.

**AILMENTS.** Hot weather can increase the reproduction of some of the worst pathogens in orchids.

Erwinia bacterial rot can “melt” a phalaenopsis collection in just a few days. It is more important now than ever to observe plants daily and take corrective actions. While it’s tempting to drench your plants with water on hot days, constant watering and puddles of standing water on plants are vectors for these pathogens. On hot days, light misting combined with good airflow are the keys to keeping all your plants healthy.

**INSECTS.** Hot temperatures also translate into increased insect activity. Check any plants summering in the yard for insects. Ant colonies will often invade the coarse, airy medium in orchid pots. Plants in such pots often decline quickly due to the change in pH that happens when ants exude their waste around orchid roots. Myrmecophila (which means “ant lover” in Latin) thrive in such acidic conditions. In nature, they live symbolically with ant colonies inside their hollow pseudobulbs. Other orchids collapse under these conditions. In addition, ants farm out other insects, such as scale, aphids and mealybugs, carrying young insects throughout your collection and returning later to harvest their sweet exudates. In general, they cannot be tolerated in an orchid collection. Immediately repot any plants that look as if ants are living in them.

**FERTILIZING.** Many lowland species are thriving now while the upland species are struggling. The warm-growing plants require copious watering and fertilizing and should be kept separate from cooler-growing plants. Take full advantage of the warm conditions for these plants.

Vandas, ascocendas, many angraecums, standard and nobile-type dendrobiums, myrmecophilas and those laelias that used to be schomburgkias, encyclias, psychopsis, *Cattleya violacea* and *Brassavola*

*nodosa* and its hybrids are among the orchids that are rapidly growing in the intense heat. Catasetums, cynoches and their allies need fertilizer to fill their growing pseudobulbs. Stanhopeas, coryanthes and their ilk are producing their exotic pendulous spikes, filling the greenhouse with delicious aromas. Make sure you have a camera handy to capture images of their luscious

but deliquescent blooms at their peak.


