Special Activity

Roundtable Discussion

Chaired by Dana Seelig

Join us for a roundtable where you can bring your problem plants. We will have an open discussion about culture, how to grow a plant that someone else is having trouble growing. All of us have problem plants, and at the same time we also have plants we are extremely successful with. This is an opportunity for all of us to learn from each other. Bring one to three problem plants; they will be visually checked for insects and signs of virus. Plants will be placed in the center of the room. When we start, plants will then be randomly selected. The grower will then be asked to take a minute or two to describe their growing area and how they water/fertilize their plant,

and so on. Members and guests will be asked to describe how they have successfully grown the same plant.

This is intended to be an educational, fun evening where everyone can learn and grow in our orchid knowledge. The evening will be organized as follows:

A. Everyone who brings an orchid will be given a ticket; place your name on half of the ticket and place it on your plant. This is to ensure that at least one plant is discussed from individuals bringing orchids. We will go through all the tickets for at least one plant.

B. You are invited to bring additional plants; these will receive a second set of tickets. We will do our best to get through all the remaining plants.

C. Some plants may give the visual impression of a virus. These plants may be isolated or placed in plastic bags. During the meeting the society will offer one virus test performed on one plant for anyone who brings in plants. We will also have a limited number of test kits for sale after the roundtable.

Virus Testing

You are invited to have ONE plant virus tested. These plants will receive a third set of tickets. Write your name on the ticket and place it on the plant. Be aware that testing will involve removing part of the bloom, or a new leaf growth—this is the recommended way to achieve the best results.

Based on interest we may place an order for virus test kits; there will be more information on this at the meeting. Bring a note pad to take names and notes on other growers you might want to follow-up with after the meeting. Join us for a hands-on Orchid Culture evening.

Stag Horn Mount with 7 Kiyoguchi × Pot. Gold Medallion Orchids

While cutting down some dead fruit trees for a friend in San Diego, I found this piece of wood with an amazing resemblance to the head of a deer, life size, with large spreading antlers. I immediately knew it would make an outstanding mount and made sure it wasn't damaged.

A year later, when it had finished drying out, I began looking for an exceptional orchid to mount on it. Such an orchid had to love being mounted, and had to be fairly small and slow growing so it would not outgrow the mount. It also had to have lots of bright and attractive blossoms. Once again our *Peter Lin* of Diamond Orchids had exactly the

right orchid: a cross between Kiyoguchi and Potinara Gold Medallion.

I have made several mounts now with Kiyoguchi and its crosses, and they are excellent orchids for mounting. Kiyoguchi is an *epicattleya*, and thrives mounted. It grows fairly slowly, does not get too big, and flowers reliably and abundantly. Its blossoms are bright gold-yellow with a gold lip with gorgeous red veining. Its crosses have all of its assets and even brighter and/or more abundant flowers. They would be great, so I immediately bought six. When I got them, I was delighted to find that some were in bloom. I removed them from their pots and washed their roots with warm water. This helps remove the bark from the roots, invigorates the plant by pumping water into it, and makes the roots more pliable and easier to form to the wood.

Making a trial fitting, I temporarily tied the orchids in attractive locations on the antlers, evenly spaced from each other. I put none on the head as I did not want to detract from the appearance of a deer's head. On the antlers, the orchids all stick upwards, mimicking the short spikes normally found on real antlers, making the mount appear to be even more realistic. One antler is longer than the other, but that is just fine. This is not a real antler, just a piece of wood that greatly resembles it. I saw that I would need one more orchid to make the spaces between plants on each antler about the same, so I ordered it from Peter. That made

seven orchids, which is even better as it follows the odd number rule.

Adding the green moss and final wires, I am very pleased with the result. It is a good looking mount, with a striking resemblance to a stag's head and antlers. It holds the orchids at eye level and spreads them out, displaying them beautifully. This is an excellent example of the wisdom of starting with a great piece of wood and finding just the right orchids to complement it.

Fast and Easy File Name Changes

Taking as many photographs as I do, I have found it very helpful to change the file name to put photos in order and to clarify what is in the picture. This was a lot of work, but was helpful enough to justify the time. I just stumbled across a way to change large groups of file names quickly and easily, and would like to pass this on to all of you. You can change many titles at one time the same way you change a single title. The example below shows a list of file names in a directory that you want to change. Only four titles are shown. *You can change any number of titles you want at the same time:*

1. Left click on the first file number to be changed, then select the rest of the numbers to be changed using either the shift or control key as usual. With the cursor still on the top selected title, right click to bring up a box, and select "rename". Type the title you want but do not put a number at the end of it. Hit enter, and all the titles will change and be automatically numbered in sequence. The top number will be

(1) and all below it will be in sequence.

For example, using the Epi Kyoguchi for the new name, you will now have:

2. To add more information to the title, use "rename" again to add the new information to the right of the bracket after the number of any title you want to change. For example, on label (02) below, add "left". On label (04) below, add "right". Now you have:

Epi Kyoguchi (01).jpg
Epi Kyoguchi (02) left.jpg
Epi Kyoguchi (03).jpg
Epi Kyoguchi (04).right.jpg

3. To change the order of any of these, just change the number in the bracket to be what you want it to be, as long as the new number does not already exist. For example, change (02) to be (05), and (04) to be (06). This is easy as neither (05) nor (06) exist in your group.

4. If either new number already exists in the group, such as (05) or (06) in our example, you would have to change that existing number first. Only then can you change the first number to what you want.

My Orchid Obsession

Once I purchase a brand new, beautiful orchid, what do I do with it? How do I care for it? How long will the flowers last? How many times a year will it bloom? Will I be able to keep it alive until it is supposed to bloom again? How often do I water it and how much? Does it need sun, or how much shade? Where do I keep it, inside or outside? If I don't have a naturally protected and sun-shaded area, what can I do to keep the sun from frying or melting my orchids? How and when do I transplant? What media do I use? What kind of fertilizer should I use? How often should I fertilize? How can I get help?

These are just some of the questions that come to mind the longer you have orchids, and the more serious you become about tending them.

When I was first introduced to orchids by my father, we had no proper area for them. The backyard and side areas are either floored mostly by concrete or bricks, which is wonderful if you want to keep everything nice and neat. But it is pretty scary when you start thinking about the fact that your plants really need 55% to 70% shade protection (and sometimes even more) and

there is not a tree to be had anywhere near your selected growing area.

The only trees on the lot are two orange trees that are really dark underneath and have no room to move around. So what we initially did was use blocks with two-by-eights for shelving and had the orchids (originally on a single shelf and then in tier formation) hugging the north side of the patio and house.

This worked well until the hottest part of the summer and into fall where the days were long and the sun very strong. Then the larger plants, or cymbidiums, were put in front to help create a little protection for the smaller or weaker plants. This helped for a while, but there is something about orchids that makes it difficult to 'say no' when you find something beautiful and reasonably priced at a show, an open house, a sale, or even a retail store. Most difficult, indeed, to keep from increasing the collection, and, of course, then

the space was no longer sufficient.

During this time, I guess we made all the same errors most new growers do on the road to knowledge and better, happier plants. Errors like fertilizing by dunking one plant in the same solution as the previous one and the same as the one to follow, reusing pots by scraping and cleaning with detergent, using no disinfectant and very few new pots, because we were unaware of the possible problems with viruses. We also had no sun screening, and were losing many orchids and wondering if it was even worth continuing to grow them. It can be pretty depressing until you start giving the plants an environment in which they can survive and thrive.

The biggest changes that made the most improvements for the orchids have not been all that expensive, like the siphon system which lightly fertilizes every time I water and costs under \$20 for the siphon and a 5 gallon bucket.

Then there's pot dressings, time-released fertilizers, and additives that make so much difference to the plants and my busy schedule.

On the more expensive side, the shade cloth over the still-increasing sections of my growing areas made one of the greatest differences. I plan to do a short article each month to discuss things like viruses, methods for what I do and the reasons behind them, construction techniques for things I use, and things I try to avoid. Who knows, maybe it will help someone who has started on a similar path.




